



## Spotted Lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula)

This agricultural pest makes use of over 70 plant species, including grape vines, hops, fruit trees, ornamental trees, woody trees, vegetables, and herbs.

Adult spotted lanternflies are approximately 1 inch long and one-half inch wide, and they have large and visually striking wings. Their forewings are light brown with black spots at the front

and a speckled band at the rear. Their hind wings are scarlet with black spots at the front and white and black bars at the rear. Their abdomen is yellow with black bars. Nymphs in their early stages of development appear black with white spots and turn to a red phase before becoming adults. Egg masses are yellowish-brown in



color, covered with a gray, waxy coating prior to hatching.
